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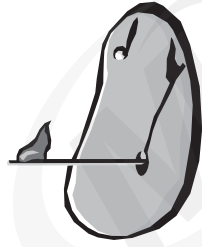

Dear Lauderdale property owners,

The Lauderdale Lakes Lake Management District (LLLMD or Lake District) is just one of several not-for-profit, volunteer organizations that exist to help enhance and preserve the quality of the lake and provide recreational opportunities that makes Lauderdale Lakes one of the very best lakes in Wisconsin.

LLLMD is a special purpose unit of government formed in 1991 under Chapter 33 of the Wisconsin Statutes in cooperation with the Town of LaGrange. Wisconsin law generally gives towns, villages, and cities the authority to enact local boating regulations though established ordinances. The Town of LaGrange establishes ordinances by which the lake district's Water Patrol enforces both state laws and laws specific to Lauderdale Lakes.

As a Wisconsin lake district, the LLLMD is governed by a board of commissioners who are elected by lake district residents to a three-year term. While Wisconsin Statutes allows for Lake District commissioners to be compensated for their time, LLLMD board commissioners have never been compensated and pay in full all fees and charges at the Lauderdale Lakes Country Club.

All Board Meetings are open to the public. If you are unable to attend in person, meetings are available using the web conferencing Zoom app. The annual meeting will be available through the Zoom app. A link will be posted on the District website. This edition of the District Dialogue includes the agenda for the upcoming September 5th, 2026 Annual Meeting, a summary of the ballot questions and the proposed 2027 budget, as well as a brief summary of this past year's accomplishments.

ANNUAL MEETING VOTER INFORMATION

The Lauderdale Lakes Lake Management District thanks you for taking time to participate and vote at the Annual Meeting. Your Board is a Board of volunteers and we all work together in a democratic process that provides direction and guidance for the recreational enjoyment, preservation and safety of our natural resource, Lauderdale Lakes. We value the input of all “electors” and “property owners” within the District and as such want to inform you of some of the guidelines for our Annual Meeting.

Registration:

Registration will occur as it has in past years, beginning at 9:15 AM at Lauderdale Lakes Country Club. We use the most current listing of District Residents to which we have access. We use Walworth County tax rolls and La Grange & Sugar Creek voter registration lists to verify elector status and distribute ballots. If for some reason your name is not on the registrar’s list or your qualifications are unclear, you may sign an “Affidavit” swearing to be a qualified elector or resident within the boundaries of the District and you will be issued a ballot.

All qualified electors and property owners within the District have the right to vote. The following describes who is qualified to vote:

All “electors” within the District are entitled to vote at the annual meeting and so are all “property owners” provided each elector and/or property owner is a U.S. citizen and 18 years of age or older on or prior to election day.

- An “elector” includes everyone residing in the District whether they own or rent the property at which they reside. They must have resided in the District for 28 days before the election. An elector may be disqualified as a result of incompetency or by reason of conviction of treason, felony, or bribery unless pardoned.
- A “property owner” includes anyone named as an owner of property who has title to property in the District. A spouse of a named property owner may also vote under the Wisconsin Marital Property Law. No one who is not a titleholder or an owner of property can vote unless they qualify as an elector as described above.
- Only one vote can be cast by any elector whether by virtue of ownership of property or elector status within the District, regardless of how many properties are owned by that person.
- Absentee and proxy voting is prohibited by Wisconsin Statutes.
- Wisconsin State law is clear regarding voting - “one person, one vote”, no matter how many properties a person owns within the District.
- Zoom participants who are not present at the meeting are not entitled to vote.

WATER SAFETY PATROL

As we head into the 2026 boating season, the Water Patrol and the Lauderdale Lakes Lake Management District (LLLMD) are working together with a simple, unified goal:

Get everyone home safely — and keep the lakes enjoyable for all.

The LLLMD Water Patrol is working to increase its presence throughout the summer by adding a new water patrol boat and recruiting additional water patrol officers. The water patrol presence is not just about enforcement — it is a visible commitment to safer, more courteous boating for everyone. Through June 30th, we have 594 water patrol hours, which includes training and administration. We have a goal of 1500 hours that will depend on weather and officer availability.

Please cooperate with and respect the Lauderdale Lakes Water Patrol.

They are out there to ensure the lakes are safe for all of us. It can be a difficult job — please make it easy for them. They are an important part of our community.

Core Safety Rules

Wear Your Life Jacket

Most boating fatalities in Wisconsin involve drowning — and most victims were not wearing life jackets. Modern PFDs are lightweight, comfortable, and designed for all ages. Fit matters, especially for children. Check straps, buckles, and weight ratings before every outing.

Know Your Speed & No-Wake Zones

No-wake restrictions protect shorelines, wildlife, and other lake users. These zones are typically near public beaches, docks, launch areas, and narrow channels. A good rule of thumb: idle speed with no whitewater behind your boat.

Navigation Lights & After-Dark Rules

Navigation lights are required on all moving vessels after sunset. Paddlers should carry a white lantern or light. Operating a boat under the influence is illegal in Wisconsin — and nighttime impaired operation is especially dangerous due to reduced visibility.

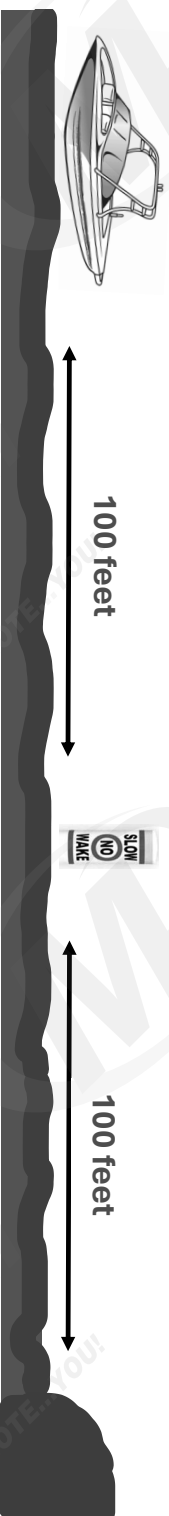
Respect Swimmers, Anglers, and Paddlers

Kayaks, paddleboards, and fishing boats are common on inland lakes and can be difficult to see. Follow these guidelines:

- Give paddlers at least 100 feet of clearance when passing
- Reduce wake around anchored boats and fishing boats
- Slow down near designated swimming areas

Responsible Wake Surf Boat Operation

**Wake enhanced boating should be operating
200 feet from the shoreline
when ballasts and fins are engaged**



Enhanced Wake Boat Guidelines

In addition to the existing rules for boating on Lauderdale Lakes, we request you utilize these guidelines for wake enhanced boat use

- Minimum distance restrictions for **wakeboarding** and **wake surfing** are **200 feet** from the shoreline so that there is **minimal environmental impact. Be mindful of your wake!** (See map)
- When wake surfing/boarding, operate the boat at a minimum depth of **20 feet.** (See map)
- Stay greater than **100 feet** from any occupied anchored boat, personal watercraft, raft, swimmer, swimming area, etc.
- Anyone wakeboarding/surfing must wear a personal flotation device.
- Disengage your fins and empty ballasts when not surfing.
- **RESPECTFUL Music Volume.** Please have consideration for your neighbors and the safety of your skiers by maintaining your music volume to a respectful level. Sound travels and we all want to be safe, mindful of others and enjoy our beautiful lake.
- **Sunday Sailboat Races:** We ask that all boats avoid boating activities during the **Sunday Sailboat Races.** Sailboat racing starts at 10 am. (Green Lake)

Wake surfing has become a growing, family-friendly sport on lakes across Wisconsin, including Lauderdale Lakes. It is enjoyable for all ages and easy on the body. When operated responsibly, wake surf boats can coexist safely with all other lake users.

The following guidelines are established by the LLLMD. Always check current Wisconsin and local boating regulations.

Operate in Appropriate Water Depth & Distance

To minimize shoreline impact and protect aquatic habitats:

- Operate in surf mode in 20 feet of water or more
- Stay at least 200 feet from shore
- Stay at least 100 feet from other watercraft

These rules reduce wave energy reaching shorelines and protect the underwater environment.

Be Mindful of Noise

Sound travels easily over water. Keep music at reasonable levels — an important courtesy that ensures all users, whether fishing, paddling, swimming, or relaxing near shore, can enjoy their time on the lake.

Give Extra Space to Smaller Watercraft

All boats must stay at least 100 feet from other watercraft. Wake surf and larger boats can generate larger wakes and require greater awareness near smaller, less maneuverable vessels, such as:

- Canoes and kayaks
- Paddleboards
- Sailboats
- Fishing boats

Respect Organized Activities

Avoid sailing races and regattas in progress. These events require consistent wind and water conditions. Wakes from nearby motorized boats can pose a safety hazard to low-profile, less maneuverable sailboats.

Share the Lake

Responsible operation means:

- Remaining alert and courteous at all times
- Adjusting behavior based on lake traffic and conditions
- Recognizing that different users enjoy the lake in different ways

Pre-Launch Safety Checklist

Before every outing, confirm you have:

- Life jackets for every passenger (properly fitted)
- Throwable flotation device (if required for vessel size)
- Valid registration and display decals
- Fully charged fire extinguisher (if required)
- Whistle or horn
- Navigation lights for evening operation

- Cell phone in a waterproof case

SEPTIC SYSTEMS

The Lake District septic pumping program began in 1992. The purpose of the program is to prevent failed septic systems from leaking into the lake and contaminating our lakes. Every property owner with a conventional septic system within the Lake District is inspected and pumped out every three years. This protects the lakes and meets Wisconsin state requirements for septic inspection and pumping. Associate Septic Services contractor from Elkhorn is hired by contract to work with the Lauderdale Lakes Management District to perform inspection and pumping services. Records are maintained by the county of every septic system that has been inspected and pumped by date. If you have any questions or need assistance on when your system is due for inspection and pumping or was done last you can contact Jane Larsen. GOLF COURSE

After a slow start to the golf season this spring due to the cool and rainy weather, through June 30, the total number of rounds played are up 169 rounds. This uptick in total rounds played is a continuing trend of the past several years as indicated in the chart below.

Clubhouse update

Following the opening of the new clubhouse on July 31, 2025, the clubhouse has been utilized by significantly more lake residents than in the recent past. For the first time the clubhouse was open throughout the winter months (Thursday evening through Sunday evening) where it served as a social gathering place to watch a variety of different sporting events and hosted a number of different special events. Some of the special events already held and scheduled in the future include: Comedy Night, Bingo, Kentucky Derby Race Party, Wine Glass Painting Class, Trailer Park Trash Murder Mystery Night and Meat Raffles on Sunday afternoons. In addition, the building has been rented for numerous private parties and the Yacht Club hosted a celebration for our country's 250th Anniversary prior to the Annual Fireworks show.

A new parking lot was completed just prior to Memorial Day weekend. With the new parking lot the clubhouse now has over three times the total number of asphalted parking spaces (73 total including 3 handicap accessible spaces). With the expanded number of asphalted parking spaces, the clubhouse now has the ability to complete the construction of the lower level of the clubhouse to provide space for community meetings and gatherings. A timeline to complete construction

of the lower level has not been determined to date. The parking lot construction project was headed up by volunteer lake resident Jack McAndrews who also was the lead construction manager for the clubhouse project.

Tree Tribute Program

Just as Lauderdale Lakes offers a perfect setting for activities in every season, the Tree Tribute Program can serve as a perfect gift for any occasion. A tree tribute gift to the Lauderdale Lakes Country Club is a unique and thoughtful way to commemorate someone special or to celebrate a wedding, anniversary, or graduation.

Your tax-deductible gift will help us to restore, maintain and sustain the Lauderdale Lakes Country Club as one of Walworth County's great public golf courses for the enjoyment of all. A donation of \$1,200 will provide for the installation of a beautiful young tree. Trees are typically planted in the Spring or Fall, and our Superintendent will provide approved species and available locations. Once the tree is planted, you will receive a personal note identifying the tree species, location, date of planting, and a custom tree marker.

Trees provide many environmental benefits including but limited to:

- Absorbing carbon dioxide (CO₂) and convert it into the oxygen we breathe
- The roots of trees often trap pollutants that would normally contaminate groundwater
- Trees hold soil in place and falling leaves return nutrients to the ground
- Trees assist in climate control, reduce air conditioning costs and air pollution
- Trees provide shelter and breeding places for wildlife

To purchase a tribute tree, contact the Lauderdale Lakes Country Club staff . Your purchase is considered a qualified tax deductible donation. Charitable distributions from Individual Retirement Accounts to purchase a tree are also considered as an eligible tax deductible donation.

ENVIRONMENTAL REPORTS

Don Jean Bay Shoreline Erosion: The shoreline was inspected on June 6, 2026. The consultant who inspected the shoreline stated that it was in good shape.

Outflow Dam: A bi-annual dam inspection was completed by our consultant in 2025. They reported that the dam structures are in good condition overall. There are some minor improvements needed to the dam. Plans to address these improvements have been scheduled. The LLLMD continues to inspect the dam quarterly and after significant weather events.

PIER INSPECTION

In 2026, we had 11 pier permits issued through early July. As a reminder, if you are installing or replacing a pier, or repairing/replacing vertical supports, a permit is required. (Pier decking may be replaced without a permit.) Securing the permit is the property owner's responsibility, not the contractor's. To apply, visit the Lake Management District website (Documents tab) for the pier permit application and review the most current Pier Ordinance (2021–03), as it is updated periodically. Contact pier inspector Kai Cook at (262) 903-8351 with any questions before starting work. Failure to obtain a permit may result in delays and double fees.

Building Maintenance-Contract Consolidation

As we are now able to use the new clubhouse year-round, we are looking at our service contracts that are impacting all 3 buildings, (Clubhouse, Equipment Maintenance and Community Center). The idea is to see if we can combine services to provide a more cost efficient and effective way to manage common maintenance activities to ensure seamless operations.

AQUATIC PLANTS

Lauderdale Lakes 5-Year Aquatic Plant Management Plan was approved by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR). We needed that approved plan as a key submission piece in gaining our 5-Year Harvesting Permit which was also approved by the WDNR prior to beginning our harvesting season this past May. WDNR has awarded us a \$9,050 grant to help offset the preparation costs for that 5 year plan which we should be getting the final invoice for shortly.

We had our original 34-year-old weed harvester refurbished, focusing on replacing the rusting and leaking carbon steel barge with a slightly used stainless steel barge and updating the rusted conveyor structural components. Refurbishment costs roughly half as much as purchasing a new harvester, making this a fiscally responsible investment. In Nov. 2025 and then again in June 2026, we submitted a grant application to the Wisconsin Waterways Commission that, if awarded, would cover up to half of the remaining restoration costs for this essential equipment that helps maintain safe, navigable waterways for our community. We are waiting to hear from the state's Waterways Commission to see if there is grant funding available this year for us to use. For the first 2 months of this season, we were renting a smaller weed harvester (for \$1) to ensure we had 2 harvesters working. The refurbished harvester was delivered from our manufacturer, Aquarius Systems in North Prairie and it was operational the week of July 13th. It is great to see this harvester get a new lease on life as we rely on having 2 larger units to effectively harvest the weeds.

Boat Trailer Launch: The three boat launches on Lauderdale Lakes and the boat launch on Pleasant Lake each have signage posted that states "IT IS UNLAWFUL TO PARK IN ANY AREA EXCEPT DESIGNATED PARKING AREAS ANYTIME. LAUNCH SITE IS CLOSED WHEN DESIGNATED PARKING AREAS ARE FULL". Furthermore, the Town of La Grange prohibits parking on all public roads. However, the Town of LaGrange through Ordinance No. 2021-04 authorizes persons and their guests to park on the public road where it abuts their property without regard to the posted prohibitions, as permitted by Section 349.13(1k)(a) of the Wisconsin Statutes. Therefore, boat trailer parking is strictly prohibited on all public roads in the Town of LaGrange without the permission of the resident whose property abuts the public road.

In the event that anyone parks their boat trailer adjacent to your property, call the Walworth County Sheriff non-emergency telephone number 262-741-4400. Violators will be ticketed and towed.
